2022 has been an outstanding year at Hit the Books. The organization has undergone significant transformation and the resulting evolution has left us with a strong foundation for growth in the years ahead.

In our organizational leadership, Justin has stepped into the role of Executive Director, while our former Executive Director, Kazz Alexander Pinkard, has transitioned to becoming a Board member. Zach is now our sole Board Chair, overseeing our newly developed Board of Directors. In terms of our program staff, we have hired a Director of Education to focus exclusively on daily academic programming. This role and renewed focus is already beginning to unlock increased academic growth potential for our students. We have also grown our support staff considerably to optimize our staffing patterns for our growing student base and program schedule.

These changes have driven remarkable results in 2022. We have worked with nearly 100 students while maintaining our rigorous standards of academic and fitness growth. We have significantly increased our program hours to enable more students in need to access our program. With a waitlist of over 150 students, we have strong demand for our program and are constantly working to expand our reach.

One of the proudest achievements we have experienced as founders of Hit the Books is how the Harlem community has welcomed us and worked with us to best serve our students. We have new tutoring partnerships in place with local high schools that reached out to us unsolicited, excited to send their students to be interns at Hit the Books. We have also partnered with Columbia University in several programs, all of which have come from inbound requests. It has been so gratifying to see these partnerships unfold and realize how well our message is spreading.

This has carried over to success in fundraising. In 2021, we did not receive a single grant. In 2022, we have raised over \$100,000 in grants across organizations such as the West Harlem Development Corporation, Stavros Niarchos Foundation, Columbia Community Service Program and others. This validation is just the beginning, and we are focused on many more fundraising opportunities in 2023.

We are so proud of what our team has accomplished this year and we cannot wait to see what 2023 has in store. None of this would be possible without our amazing students, parents, staff, donors, and supporters in all forms. We cannot tell you enough how much we appreciate your constant belief in what we are building. Here is to an amazing 2023!

As an educator, it has always been my goal to bring additional educational resources to underserved communities. This is a key component in the mission statement at Hit the Books and the main thing that drew me to the organization. When I came across the opportunity to lead the academic program at Hit the Books, it felt like a perfect fit. Upon visiting the facility and meeting the staff, I was inspired by the enthusiasm and excitement that filled the space. It was also amazing that the students were able to receive such meaningful resources like access to a brand-new facility, uniforms, and dinner all at no cost to the parents.

Since joining the Hit the Books team, I hired 4 tutors and 2 teaching assistants to provide additional support. The iReady program is a great computer program that functions well on its own. I have just maximized its effectiveness by adding instructional activities that are aligned with their lessons. In addition, I designed differentiated lessons based on how the students performed on their initial diagnostics. Having the students in groups with a tutor based on their current need means that we are meeting them where they are and as a result, they can grow faster. A big highlight for me so far was the Winter Wonderland celebration. Students rotated to different stations and participated in winter themed activities. This celebration significantly increased student attendance on the last day before a holiday break. Overall, I believe that I have helped to add more structure, rigor and fun to the academic program, and this is only the beginning!

How We Will Achieve Our Mission



- We serve as a community within a community, where children feel safe and view the facility as a second home

2022 has been an amazing year of growth, with initiatives underway for continued growth in 2023. We have increased our number of full-time students consistently since our inception, increasing our impact on the Harlem Community

We have made several changes to our schedule in 2023 to optimize our programming and ensure we can serve as many students as possible out of our facility

7th + 8th Grade Classes and Evening Classes

- In addition to our original 2PM-6PM programming we have expanded our classes to include 6PM-8PM classes for 7th and 8th graders, a new cohort for our program
- While this was only on Tuesdays in the Fall, we will be expanding our evening program to Monday as well beginning in 2023, allowing for four classes per week for 7th + 8th graders
- We are also in the process of crafting new programming to stimulate the 7th + 8th grade students in addition to our typical math and reading enrichment

Saturday Programming

- In an effort to expand our community reach, we have started opening on Saturdays to allow students with pre-existing after school commitments to enroll in Hit the Books
- This will allow for as many as 40 new students enrolled at Hit the Books per week



Our program was designed based on extensive research on effective academic programming. Recent academic studies indicate why programs like Hit the Books are <u>needed now more than ever</u>

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- Bloom Two Sigma Study: A combination of 1-on-1 tutoring and mastery learning* improved educational efficiency by two standard deviations on average

Recent Studies



- Education Department: schools nationwide recorded the largest drop in math scores ever this year, with the average testing score down (3%) since 2019
- These results are heartbreaking reversing decades of academic progress




- NWEA Study: gaps in test scores by student race and family income grew even larger in 2021
- Part of this is because low achieving students prior to the pandemic experienced even larger initial impacts at the onset of the pandemic
- Our Student population has been particularly affected, and needs Hit the Books to help reverse learning loss!

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Our focus at Hit the Books is impact on our Students, and we are constantly evolving our strategy to achieve this goal. Our students' academic and fitness growth remained strong in 2022 and the gap between new and return students' academic standing shows the power of a year at HTB



New SEL Programming Initiative


- In 2022 100% of our parents agreed their children were Doing Better in School, Healthier, Enjoying Hit the Books, and More Confident
- Starting in the fall of 2022 we are using Hello Insight as an SEL testing resource to measure our students' SEL growth

Financial Summary



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Hit the Books has spent nearly 100% of its funds on programming in order to maximize impact. We expect this ratio to remain relatively consistent in 2023, with additions to programming coming (Director of Education, expanded hours) as well as a slight expansion of our fundraising budget



Despite our budget growing from 2021-2022, our cost per student, child, and per hour of programming have dropped dramatically while results have remained strong due to our efficient operating model*



Donor Summary



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We have diversified our donor base with additional corporate and grant funding in 2022 while increasing the total dollar amount of our individual donations. We see corporate and government funding as opportunities in 2023 and have hired a grant writer to focus on government funding as well as volunteer consultants to better understand the corporate funding landscape



2022 has seen a massive expansion of our fundraising platform. We have re-focused our efforts on higher dollar donors, leading to more efficient fundraising. We have also seen growth in donation from numerous donors on a year over year basis, which we hope will continue in 2023


